The tradition behind today's ceremony

The concept of the Chorister Bishop ceremony draws its inspiration from the Gospels where Jesus said that to enter the Kingdom of God one must become as a child (Matthew 18.3). Through this teaching, Jesus taught his disciples an unforgettable lesson about humility and belonging to the kingdom of God. He placed children at the centre of his ministry and work. The symbolism of Jesus' actions remains more powerful than many words. At the heart of the Chorister Bishop ceremony is the same profound gospel truth, subverting concepts of power and authority with a vision of the Kingdom of God from the perspective of children and young people.

In Medieval times, the Chorister Bishop ceremony was an important annual tradition here at York Minster. On the 6th December, the Feast of St Nicholas, one of the Cathedral Choristers was elected bishop while others acted as canons, discharging all the Offices except the Mass until Holy Innocents' Day (28th December). The custom probably started in the twelfth century: restrictions were placed upon it in many cathedrals in the later Middle Ages but at York the chorister bishops still had wide powers in the fourteenth and fifteenth centuries, collecting monies from around the Diocese and distributing gifts to the poor. Lists of the 'young bishops' exist from 1416 until 1537 when the custom was suppressed by Henry VIII.

In the last thirty years or so, a number of English Cathedrals have 'resurrected' this ancient ceremony and chorister bishops have led prayers and given a short address whilst wearing robes of office: a cloak, a mitre and a pastoral staff. The service in many ways is symbolic of the mighty being brought down from their seats and the lowly and humble raised up. The Choristers will recognise these words as coming from the Magnificat, which they sing daily as part of the Office of Choral Evensong. This simple ceremony gives us the opportunity to hear the vision of our children and young people and commit to creating a world where their voices are heard.

During the Magnificat, the Bishop (for today, the Bishop of Whitby) will descend from his stall and take off his vestments of office. In the final part of the service the nominated Chorister Bishop will be escorted forward by their 'Canons' and they will all be vested in the robes of their office and receive a book of prayers. The Chorister Bishop will be commissioned and will then deliver a short address on behalf of all the choristers and children everywhere.

First Lesson

The First Lesson is taken from the Book of the Prophet Isaiah.

Ah, you who drag iniquity along with cords of falsehood, who drag sin along as with cart-ropes, who say, 'Let him make haste,

let him speed his work

that we may see it;

let the plan of the Holy One of Israel hasten to fulfilment, that we may know it!'

Ah, you who call evil good and good evil,

who put darkness for light and light for darkness,

who put bitter for sweet and sweet for bitter!

Ah, you who are wise in your own eyes, and shrewd in your own sight!

Ah, you who are heroes in drinking wine and valiant at mixing drink,

who acquit the guilty for a bribe, and deprive the innocent of their rights! Therefore, as the tongue of fire devours the stubble, and as dry grass sinks down in the flame, so their root will become rotten, and their blossom go up like dust; for they have rejected the instruction of the Lord of hosts, and have despised the word of the Holy One of Israel.

Therefore the anger of the Lord was kindled against his people, and he stretched out his hand against them and struck them; the mountains quaked,

and their corpses were like refuse in the streets.

For all this his anger has not turned away, and his hand is stretched out still.

He will raise a signal for a nation far away, and whistle for a people at the ends of the earth; Here they come, swiftly, speedily! None of them is weary, none stumbles, none slumbers or sleeps, not a loincloth is loose. not a sandal-thong broken; their arrows are sharp, all their bows bent. their horses' hoofs seem like flint, and their wheels like the whirlwind. Their roaring is like a lion, like young lions they roar; they growl and seize their prey, they carry it off, and no one can rescue. They will roar over it on that day, like the roaring of the sea. And if one looks to the land only darkness and distress; and the light grows dark with clouds.

Second Lesson

The Second Lesson is taken from the Acts of the Apostles.

Then Paul and his companions set sail from Paphos and came to Perga in Pamphylia. John, however, left them and returned to Jerusalem; but they went on from Perga and came to Antioch in Pisidia. And on the sabbath day they went into the synagogue and sat down. After the reading of the law and the prophets, the officials of the synagogue sent them a message, saying, 'Brothers, if you have any word of exhortation for the people, give it.' So Paul stood up and with a gesture began to speak:

You Israelites, and others who fear God, listen. The God of this people Israel chose our ancestors and made the people great during their stay in the land of Egypt, and with uplifted arm he led them out of it. For about forty years he put up with them in the wilderness. After he had destroyed seven nations in the land of Canaan, he gave them their land as an inheritance for about four hundred and fifty years. After that he gave them judges until the time of the prophet Samuel. Then they asked for a king; and God gave them Saul son of Kish, a man of the tribe of Benjamin, who reigned for forty years. When he had removed him, he made David their king. In his testimony about him he said, "I have found David, son of Jesse, to be a man after my heart, who will carry out all my wishes." Of this man's posterity God has brought to Israel a Saviour, Jesus, as he promised; before his coming John had already proclaimed a baptism of repentance to all the people of Israel. And as John was finishing his work, he said, "What do you suppose that I am? I am not he. No, but one is coming after me; I am not worthy to untie the thong of the sandals on his feet."

'My brothers, you descendants of Abraham's family, and others who fear God, to us the message of this salvation has been sent. Because the residents of Jerusalem and their leaders did not recognize him or understand the words of the prophets that are read every sabbath, they fulfilled those words by condemning him. Even though they found no cause for a sentence of death, they asked Pilate to have him killed. When they had carried out everything that was written about him, they took him down from the tree and laid him in a tomb. But God raised him from the dead; and for many days he appeared to those who came up with him from Galilee to Jerusalem, and they are now his witnesses to the people.'

The Chorister Bishop and their Canons are vested. The Chorister Bishop is clothed with a cloak of office and a mitre, and given a pastoral staff and a pectoral cross.
