The Office of High Sheriff

The Office of High Sheriff has existed for over a millennium and precedes that of the Chancellorship as the oldest secular office under the Crown.

Only a High Sheriff may nominate a person to the Lord Chancellor and the Privy Council for consideration by the Sovereign to serve as High Sheriff. The annual nominations of three prospective High Sheriffs for each county are made on 12 November at a meeting of the Lords of the Council in the Queen's Bench Division of the High Court of Justice presided over by the Lord Chief Justice. Subsequently the selection of the High Sheriff is made in March when the Sovereign, by tradition, 'pricks' the appointees name with a silver bodkin. The Warrant of appointment is then received by the new High Sheriff.

The High Sheriff takes up the appointment for one year upon making a sworn declaration usually before a Judge of Her Majesty's High Court of Justice. The High Sheriff is the Sovereign's representative in the county for all matters relating to the judiciary and the maintenance of law and order.

Other responsibilities of the High Sheriff include attendance at all Royal visits to the county; the well being and protection of Her Majesty's High Court Judges when on circuit in the county and to attend them to Court in Legal Terms (in practice, protection of the judges, and the maintenance of law and order, is delegated to the Chief Constable); to be the returning officer for Parliamentary elections in county constituencies; and to be responsible for the Proclamation of Accession of a new Sovereign.

The Office of High Sheriff remained first in precedence in the counties until the reign of Edward VII when an Order in Council in 1908 gave the Lord Lieutenant the prime office under the Crown as the Sovereign's personal representative.

The Service

The Chapter of York—the governing body of the Minster—welcomes warmly all members of the congregation to this service. The service substantially follows the order of Evensong, the traditional evening service of the Church of England. In participating in this service, you are joining in the constant round of regular daily prayer that has been at the heart of the Minster's life through the centuries.

The service includes a sequence of psalms, readings and canticles, followed by the Creed and formal prayers ('collects')—a pattern that has remained virtually unchanged since the first English Prayer Book of 1549. It is followed by an anthem sung by the choir, an address, and prayers particularly suited to this afternoon's occasion.

Although this form of worship comes distinctively from the liturgical tradition of the Church of England, we hope that people of all faiths and traditions will find that many of its sentiments are such that they can sympathise with them.

As is customary at a cathedral service of this kind, much of the music is sung by the choir alone; members of the congregation are invited to join fully in singing the hymns, and in saying the words printed in bold type.

The service is sung by the Choir of York Minster, directed by Benjamin Morris, Assistant Director of Music, York Minster. The organ is played by Asher Oliver, Assistant Organist.

The Fanfare Trumpeters of the West Yorkshire Police Band participate by kind permission of the Chief Constable of West Yorkshire.

At 2.25, a Canon welcomes the congregation and notices are given.

Her Majesty's Lord Lieutenant of North Yorkshire, the Judges, the High Sheriffs and the Legal and Civic Procession are met by the Dean and Chapter representatives at the South Door.

A fanfare is sounded and organ music is played. Please stand.

First Lesson

read by the Revd Martin Macdonald Chaplain to the High Sheriff of West Yorkshire

The First Lesson is from the Book Exodus.

Then God spoke all these words:

I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery; you shall have no other gods before me.

You shall not make for yourself an idol, whether in the form of anything that is in heaven above, or that is on the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth. You shall not bow down to them or worship them; for I the Lord your God am a jealous God, punishing children for the iniquity of parents, to the third and the fourth generation of those who reject me, but showing steadfast love to the thousandth generation of those who love me and keep my commandments.

Second Lesson

read by the Revd Canon John Manchester Chaplain to the High Sheriff of North Yorkshire

The Second Lesson is from the Letter of Paul to the Romans.

Let every person be subject to the governing authorities; for there is no authority except from God, and those authorities that exist have been instituted by God. Therefore, whoever resists authority resists what God has appointed, and those who resist will incur judgement. For rulers are not a terror to good conduct, but to bad. Do you wish to have no fear of the authority? Then do what is good, and you will receive its approval; for it is God's servant for your good. But if you do what is wrong, you should be afraid, for the authority does not bear the sword in vain! It is the servant of God to execute wrath on the wrongdoer. Therefore, one must be subject, not only because of wrath but also because of conscience. For the same reason you also pay taxes, for the authorities are God's servants, busy with this very thing. Pay to all what is due to them—taxes to whom taxes are due, revenue to whom revenue is due, respect to whom respect is due, honour to whom honour is due. Owe no one anything, except to love one another; for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law. The commandments, 'You shall not commit adultery; You shall not murder; You shall not steal; You shall not covet'; and any other commandment, are summed up in this word, 'Love your neighbour as yourself.' Love does no wrong to a neighbour; therefore, love is the fulfilling of the law.
