Join us in making origami cranes to fly at the heart of the Minster








# Call for Cranes

You can make one crane for yourself, to hang at home or in the classroom, and one for us. Are you partnered with a school abroad? Do you have an international pen pal? Feel free to invite them to join in too!

# The Inspiration

Origami is the Japanese art of folding paper and has been practised for over 400 years.

In Japan cranes symbolise health and 1,000 years of long life. A thousand origami paper cranes are often given to a person who is ill, to wish for their recovery. Some people also believe that if you fold a thousand cranes they will be granted one wish.

The pandemic has made the last year difficult in all sorts of ways. Making cranes is an expression of hope, and the word for this in Japanese is *kibō*.

York Minster and local artist, Penny Phillips, invite you to make origami cranes to express how you feel about the last year.

You might want to use your crane to think about recovery, a loved one, or your hopes for the future.

It will fly alongside hundreds of cranes made by other children too.





#### Instructions

Origami cranes can be made with traditional origami paper, ordinary coloured or plain paper, newspaper, or any other material you have to hand that keeps its shape nicely once folded. You can draw on your cranes, write a wish, message, story, poem, your name, or leave them blank.

Feel free to get creative!

This activity can be done inside or outside, at school or home, alone or with friends, in person or over video call – however works best for you.

You will need: a square piece of paper, that's all — just make sure you know which side is which.


