A Message from the Archbishop of York



This afternoon's gathering in York Minister is one of a myriad of services being offered throughout our nation and the Commonwealth to honour the memory of Her Late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. It is right that we acknowledge and give thanks for her most extraordinary reign, spanning as it did, over 70 years.

Yet in that reign, which adapted and changed as the life of the world changed so much, Her Late Majesty embodied that which was secure, timeless and reassuring. Hers was a life of deep commitment to her constitutional task, but above all to the people over whom she reigned but whom she understood she served.

That apparent paradox sprung from Her Majesty's deep Christian faith and her understanding that her life, dedicated to following Jesus Christ, meant that she was to follow his teaching and example that 'I am among you as one who serves' (Luke 22.24). Her life of service was patterned on the one to whom she bent the knee, and in the manner of her living and her dying, we are able to see reflected the glory of God and understand how those who follow him gain strength and courage for their task.

I extend my apologies that I am not able to be in York Minister today due to the responsibilities I have in London in these days. However, I unite my prayers with yours and with those around the world in commending the soul of our Late Queen to the tender mercy of God, praying that she may receive the crown of everlasting life – which is the same crown offered to all who turn to Christ. I invite you also to pray for His Majesty King Charles III in the task now entrusted to him, that he may be wise and faithful. And let us remember all who mourn, particularly the Royal Family, seeking the comfort of Almighty God.

May Her Late Majesty rest in peace and rise in glory and may God save the King.
