
MY GUIDE TO LIVING THINGS AT YORK MINSTER









FIND THE LEAF

As you make your way around the park, have a look for these leaves. Tick the box when you have identified one and then see if you can sketch it below. If you can find a leaf on the ground you could use it to help you make an accurate drawing.







Did you know?

Medieval Masons wanted to create a little piece of Heaven on Earth when they built the Minster and they used nature to inspire them. For example, you can see all sorts of leaves, flowers and animals in the stone carvings and stained glass windows of the Minster.

SENSORY GARDEN

Make your way down to the end of the Park and on your left you will find our sensory garden. There are lots of herbs planted here. If you want to, you can touch the leaves and smell their scent. Can you find a plant that smells like lemons? Or one that reminds you of toothpaste? Or one that smells like garlic bread? Choose your favourite smelling plant and draw the shape of the leaf in the box.



BUG HOTEL

While you are here, stop and check out our Bug Hotel. If you are very lucky you might be able to spot a worm, woodlouse or earwig. Our Gardeners have been creating habitats for wildlife to make their homes here. We also have hedgehogs that have been rescued and now live in our grounds.



WILD FLOWER MEADOW

At the back of the park you will also find our wildflower meadow that attracts insects and bees. Can you see or hear any here? How many different colours can you count in the flower meadow?

Did you know?

In Medieval times when York Minster was built, plants, flowers and leaves had meanings. For example, roses and lilies were symbols of Mary, the Mother of Jesus. Holly leaves represent the crown of thorns worn by Christ on Good Friday and the berries represent his blood. The leaves are also evergreen which represents everlasting life. The oak tree is also used in the Bible as a metaphor to describe God's strength and Power.



During spring and summer we have a pair of Peregrines nesting at the Minster. They are called Mr and Mrs Minster!
