WELCOME TO THE SUMMER NEWSLETTER

As I am writing this, it is hard to believe that this will be my last input into our Newsletter. It has been my great privilege to be Director of York Minster Fund for the last 9 years, but now is the right time for me to move on to pastures new.

In my time with the Fund I have been lucky enough to be involved in some great projects. In 2018 we completed the final section of the Great East Window restoration, and then with further support from the National Lottery were able to embark on the 20- year Glass plan to continue the process of protecting the Minster's precious windows. During this period, we have managed to protect more than 15 windows and are well on the way with the windows of the South Transept.

The focus of the stone restoration during my time has been on the South Quire Aisle. We have supported the restoration of parapets and pinnacles, buttresses and grotesques and it is especially pleasing to see that we are now beginning to come to the end of the work in certain areas; although the St Cuthbert Transept still has much work to do.

All this work has been underpinned by the ongoing support for the continuation and development of heritage skills. This came to full fruition in the completion of the Centre of Excellence for Heritage Skills, which not only brings together the latest technology with the best of heritage skills, but also shows what is possible in terms of design, even on a historic estate.

It's not all just about fabric though in the Fund. Between 2018 and 2020 we supported the restoration of the Grand Organ and have supported many other projects within the music and collections and learning teams...we even managed to find the oranges for the Christingle one year!

Over the last 9 years we have been able to make grants and co-ordinate funding of over £25m for the Minster.

But our work is not only about spending money. It has to be raised first and with the dedicated skill of the YMF team we have hopefully put some Fun into the Fundraising. We have held concerts and dinners; lightshows and Christmas tree festivals; sold badges and books, and all through this period you have been incredibly generous in your support for all the work we do.

But one thing you learn in a place like York Minster is that there is always much more to do and we are all only small links in a chain that stretches back over a thousand years. In our time we do what we can, but we all stand on the shoulders of those who have gone before us.

So, in this edition of our newsletter, you will hear of our continuing work and ways in which we endeavour to raise money and protect this incredible building.

I have been incredibly fortunate to have been part of York Minster Fund, but everything we have done has only been possible through your generous support. So, all that remains for me to do is say thank you once again and to wish you all every success in the future.

I am delighted to update you that I will be leaving the Fund in the safe hands of New Director Chris Loughran. Chris has significant experience in charity management. including his current voluntary role as Chair of the Beamish Museum. You will be able to learn more about his work and plans in the next addition.

Although leaving the Minster is a big change, I am very much looking forward to many exciting adventures ahead, travelling the world with my wonderful husband, having more time to tend our 80+ roses, painting and seeing more of our family, but I very much hope to stay in touch with life in the Minster too!

A TRANSFORMATIONAL GIFT FROM THE JULIA RAUSING FOUNDATION

We are delighted to announce an extraordinary £500,000 donation from the Julia Rausing Trust. This major gift has brought the fundraising campaign for the Centre of Excellence for Heritage Skills and Estate Management to a successful close. It will also fund vital conservation of three stained glass windows in the South Transept.

This support marks the beginning of the first major fabric and repair project to be undertaken in the new Centre. The work will include a detailed analysis of the iconic Rose Window which last received restoration following the 1984 fire.

The Very Reverend Dominic Barrington, Dean of York, said:

"All at York Minster are deeply grateful for this gift, which will benefit so many people, from heritage craftspeople from around the world to the many visitors who come to our historic site each year."

THE NOEL GODDARD TERRY CHARITABLE TRUST SUPPORTS SOUTH TRANSEPT CONSERVATION

We are pleased to share that the Noel Goddard Terry Charitable Trust has generously donated £9,000 towards the conservation and protection of the South Transept windows. This thoughtful gift contributes towards the restoration of windows S14, located just below the Rose Window. S14 features the crest of Noel Goddard Terry, introduced during the last major restoration intervention in the 1970s, (see image). Rich in colour and symbolism, the shield incorporates emblems of heritage and craftsmanship and is beautifully framed within an ornate border of blue and gold glass. The Terry's family legacy at York Minster is a lasting one, and we are honoured that the Trust continues to support the ongoing conservation of the Minster's fabric.

RIDE RETRO

Last December, we were thrilled to welcome members of Backfire Promotions and the York Inset Scooter Club to the Minster, where they presented a generous donation of £750 in support of the York Minster Fund. Although the much-loved Ride Retro event was unable to go ahead last year, the Club's support remained unwavering. The development of the Centre of Excellence for Heritage Skills and Estate Management has not only created a physical space for innovation and training, but also a growing network of like-minded organisations who share our passion for heritage.

APPRENTICE UPDATE

Thanks to the generous support of the Worshipful Company of Constructors Charitable Trust, we caught up with stonemasonry apprentice Jemima Davies to reflect on the first six months of her time at the York Minster, funded by the Trust.

Jemima has become a valued part of the Minster's Masonry team, contributing to both on-site and workshop activity. Her role has included dismantling parts of the South Quire parapet and supporting lifting operations using forklifts and the gantry crane. She's also developing confidence in handling large stones, having trained on the Minster's newly-installed wire saw and overhead crane.

In February, Jemima began work on her first commissioned stone – a shaft moulding for the S10 buttress. It's her most complex piece to date, and one she is completing with growing independence and skill.

Alongside her technical development, Jemima is nurturing her artistic practice. A two-day sculpture workshop earlier this year introduced her to clay modelling techniques and the creative flow that lies behind traditional carving.

Reflecting on her journey so far, Jemima said:

"I'm incredibly grateful to the Worshipful Company of Constructors Charitable Trust for making this apprenticeship possible. Their support has given me the chance not only to develop my craft, but to be part of something truly meaningful in preserving our heritage."

We are proud to support Jemima on her apprenticeship and deeply thankful to the Worshipful Company of Constructors for making this opportunity possible. Supporting apprentices like Jemima means preserving centuries of heritage skills at York Minster.
